stalled with plate windows on the lower level and transom windows above new canopies.

Meanwhile, 2022 statewide numbers were recently published in "Public Libraries in Louisiana: Statistical Report" and also showed an increase. The state's public libraries recorded more than nine million visits and patrons checked out items more than 46 million times, making double-digit growth over the prior year.

"Public libraries are so important to the communities they serve," said Lt. Gov. Billy Nungesser. "The proof is there in black and white when you look at these stats. Our libraries are true community hubs with so many different and invaluable services. A vibrant state needs vibrant public libraries, and we have that here in Louisiana."

In-person visits to the 334 public library locations and 29 bookmobiles across the state dropped steeply during the pandemic when stay-athome orders were in place. However, visits have steadily increased since 2020.

Additionally, Franklin Parish Library showed a 4.01 percent increase in circulation from the prior year. Circulation is anything a patron borrow's from the facility such as books or DVDs, according to Shirley.

2023 circulation numbers totaled 49,252 compared to 2022's 47,353.

Topping the books that local patrons checked out were "Where The Crawdad's Sing" by Delia Owens, "I Can Be Anything" by Neville Astley, "Dog Man: A Tale Of Two Kitties" by Dav Pilkey and "Throne of Glass" by Sarah J. Maas. Use of electronic resources have also continued to grow statewide and at home. Public computer use increased by 7.75 percent or 2,184 in Franklin Parish Library. In 2022, computers were used 2,027 times.

Wi-Fi use increased by nearly 20 percent at the local library to 1,477.

Throughout Louisiana, patrons used public library computers 1.8 million times and logged on to Wi-Fi 4.7 million times in 2022.

"These figures clearly show the public's enthusiasm for all the services libraries provide, especially when you consider that Louisiana's population is about 4.5 million people," said State Librarian Meg Placke. "We say it all the time: the modern library is more than just a place to check out books and the best part is, these services are offered free of charge."

There were 2.4 million library card holders in Louisiana, almost 54 percent of the state, according to the 2022 report. Librarians answered 2.5 million reference questions in person and online.

Some 2.1 million people attended almost 75,000 in-person and virtual events hosted by public libraries. Electronic databases were accessed almost 26 million times by library card holders.

More than 72,000 items were borrowed by patrons from their home library from another library through the Interlibrary Loan System.
