HAIL STORM STRIKES HERE WEDNESDAY EVE

Nuggets Large as Hen Eggs Fall; Storm Lasts 16 Minutes.

The weather man played one on his pranks here late Wednesday evening when a hail storm struck this city and lasted for approximately sixteen minutes, causing damage to plate glass windows.

The hail storm was confined practically to the immediate vicinity of Winnsboro with particles of ice as large as hen eggs falling during the sixteen minute period that the storm ran. The hail storm was followed by rain.

Automobiles throughout the city and approaching the city were pelted with the large nuggets of ice with the result that a number of windshields were broken.

It is possible that the crops throughout this immediate section will be damaged.

Soybeans Show Promise Of Becoming Major Cash Crop

Soybeans are now showing a promise of becoming a major source of farm income in Franklin parish. With closer markets and a loan value of \$2.10 per bushel, farmers are becoming more interested in this crop.

There are several established varieties which for the most part are well known and generally grown, but one of the excellent varieties being grown on considerable large acreage is the Lee. This bean not only yields exceedingly well, but holds its seed well. This is quite an advantage where harvesting is delayed for any reason.

Soybeans are a valuable crop for farm rotation because of the period of time for planting, the crop is adapted to a wide variety of soils, easy crop to produce, handled with equipment used for grains, lends itself to a high degree of mechanization and is a good soil building crop.

Planting Date

Greater yields can be expected from soybeans planted between May 5-30. If planted in April, the plant becomes stunted and if

Practical Dishes For Busy Days

We suggest these recipes for easily-prepared, savoury dishes for use on busy days when dinner must be prepared at the last minute. When you have used them you will think that they are good dishes for any day!

Chili Con Carne—Brown 1 pound ground beef in skillet with 2 tablespoons fat and finely chopped onion. Season with salt and pepper, add 1 medium can Oven Baked Red Kidney Beans. Simmer for few minutes, add 1 small can Tomato Soup. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon Chili powder, cook for ten minutes. Serve with boiled or baked potatoes. (Some people prefer to omit the Chili powder).

Sausages with Kidney Beans—Brown Sausage in a skillet. Pour over it 1 can Kidney Beans and simmer or bake in slow oven for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour. Place beans in center of hot platter, surround with sausages and garnish with sprigs of parsley.

Ham with Ketchup Sauce—Brown thick slice of ham in skillet, place in casserole, cover with the following sauce:
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup Tomato Ketchup or Chili Sauce; $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cold water, 1 tablespoon Pure Vinegar; 2 teaspoons flour; 1 teaspoon sugar; $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon Prepared Mustard.

Bake in a moderate oven or simmer until tender (about $\frac{1}{2}$ hour).

Creamed Ham Patties—
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups diced cold cooked ham; 2 tablespoons Stuffed Spanish Olives chopped; 2 tablespoons butter; 3 tablespoons flour; $1\frac{1}{4}$ cups milk; pepper, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce; 1 loaf bread.

Melt butter in a saucepan, add flour and stir until well blended. Add ham and seasonings to cream sauce. Cut bread in 6 slices, trim off crusts, cut in squares and hollow out center. Toast boxes thus

made, fill with the creamed ham. Garnish with parsley and serve. Cold pork or veal may be prepared in the same way.

Everyday Chop Suey—

1 pound ground beef; 2 onions; 2 green peppers; 1 cup water; 3 tablespoons butter; 1 teaspoon salt; $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon pepper; 1 medium can Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce with Cheese.

In a skillet with butter, fry chopped onions and green pepper, until slightly brown. Add chopped meat and fry until meat browns. Add water, season with salt and pepper, simmer for 10 minutes. Add Spaghetti, allow to boil and serve.

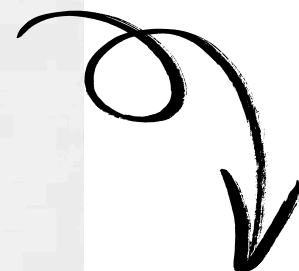


Boston Rolls—

1 can Baked Beans, 1 cup grated cheese; 1 tablespoon chopped onion; 1 cup bread crumbs; $\frac{1}{4}$ cup milk.

Drain sauce from beans, chop them, add crumbs, onion, cheese, salt to taste, and enough milk to moisten. Form into small cakes or rolls, place in buttered baking dish in moderate oven for 30 minutes. Baste several times with one cup boiling water to which has been added $\frac{1}{4}$ cup Tomato Ketchup. This dish makes an excellent substitute for meat.

1-POUND ASSORTED SPRING VEGETABLES (SUCH AS CARROTS, ASPARAGUS, RADISHES, SPRING ONIONS, SQUASH, ZUCCHINI, BROCCOLI, OR SUGAR-SNAP PEAS), TRIMMED OR PEELED IF NEEDED

MARINADE:

¼ C OLIVE OIL

2 TABLESPOONS BALSAMIC VINEGAR

1 TABLESPOON LEMON JUICE

2 GARLIC CLOVES, MINCED

¼ TEASPOON FRESH GROUND SEA SALT

½ TEASPOON FRESH GROUND PEPPER

1/8 – ½ TEASPOON CRUSHED RED PEPPER FLAKES

- 1. PLACE THE VEGETABLES IN A LARGE BOWL.**
- 2. IN A SMALL BOWL, WHISK THE MARINADE INGREDIENTS.**
- 3. POUR OVER VEGETABLES. TOSS TO COAT.**
- 4. IN A LARGE SKILLET, SAUTÉ VEGETABLE MIXTURE IN BATCHES FOR 3-6 MINUTES OR UNTIL CRISP-TENDER.**

SERVE WARM OR REFRIGERATE IMMEDIATELY.

Origin of Ice Cream

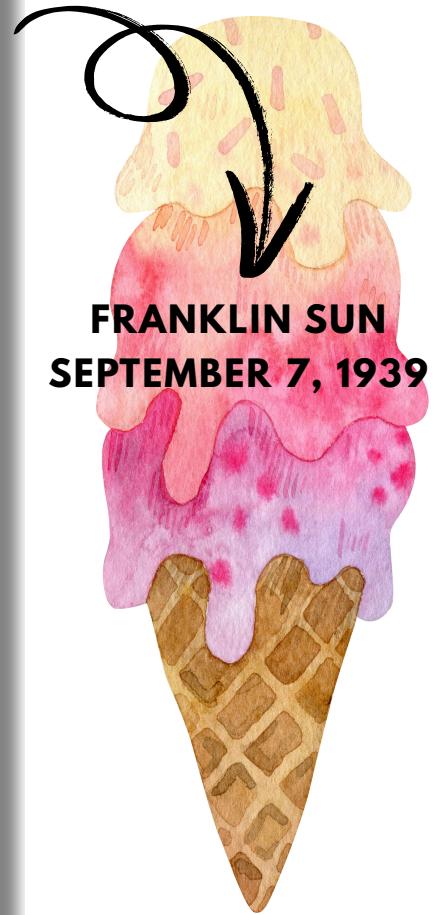
Attempts to trace the origin of ice cream have been generally inconclusive, the invention or discovery of this popular dish being attributed to various nations and periods. But ice cream, or something closely akin to it, has been traced as far back as the middle of the sixteenth century, when it was introduced into France, from Italy.

By 1630, it is said, an enterprising Sicilian had established the Cafe Procope in Paris, where ice cream was the special delicacy. It became known in England and Germany much later, and was probably not introduced into America until about the time of the Revolution.

The first advertisement of ice cream appeared in New York on June 6, 1786, but it was not served in Washington until nearly a half century later, when Mrs. Alexander Hamilton used it as a dessert at a dinner given for President Jackson. The wholesale ice cream business was originated by Jacob Fussell of Baltimore in 1851, and met immediate success.

In recent years the use of ice cream has been increasing with amazing rapidity, until its production has almost reached the proportions of a major industry, being about 350 million gallons annually.

The increased consumption of ice cream is entirely desirable, as it is not only an aid to the dairy industry, but also is in the interest of better nutrition and consequently of good health.
