Pairing fiction and nonfiction texts enhances readers' comprehension of a particular topic, exposes them to a wider range of vocabulary, and builds background knowledge—and therefore interest.

Martin Is Signed By Chicago Cards For Pro Football

Caleb S. Martin, 23, of Winnsboro, has signed a contract to play professional football this fall for the Chicago Cardinals, one of the top three teams of the Western division, according to information received by the Sun today.

Young Martin, who is co-owner of Martin Brothers Ice Cream factory and retail store in Winnsboro, played high school football for four years before graduating from Winnsboro high, and later played for La. Tech in the 1941-42 and 1946 seasons.

The husky athlete, who plays tackle, was also a member of the Ft. Benning Doughboy's eleven while he was a physical training instructor at Ft. Benning Officer Candidate school during the war

The former first lieutenant signed with the Cardinals in early June after ejecting bids from the San Francisco Forty-niners and the Buffalo Bisons, the latter team in the American league. Both the Cardinals and the Forty-Niners are in the National league.

"Caleb was an outstanding athlete and student at Winnsboro high," stated W. B. Glover, former principal of the school. Mr. Glover said that Martin was "always dependable and set a fine example both in football and basketball, his two principal sports."

He will leave on August 7 to report to Carrol college in Wisconsin for training.

FASHIONS FOR JULY.

WALKING DRESSES.

1. Round dress of lilac, or other coloured muslin; full sleeves of white muslin and lace; the dress cut low round the bosom, and worn with a handkerchief. Bonnet of white thip and lilac crape, an amented with a large round seather, which is fixed in front to hang over the left side.—2. An open sobe of white muslin; with full long sleeves confined to the size of the arm in three places; petticoat of the same, with a narrow slounce at bottom. Witching hat of white chip, lined with plak, and turned up on one fide; a bow of pink ribbon on the left side.

HEAD DRESSES.

1. A round hat of brown willow, turned up on one fide with a bow, and ornamented with an offrich feather of the same colour .- 2. A bonnet of lilac crape, a crape role and offrich feather in front.-3. A bonnet of white chip turned up on one fide, and lined and ornamented with pink; white offrich feather on the right fide .- 4. A turban of white' crape, or mullin, ornamented with feveral white offrich feathers, which are fixed a little on the right fide, to hang carelefaly over the head .- 5. A cap of white muslin, ornamented with wreaths of white ribbon, and a bunch of ity leaves .- 6 A turban of pink crape, ornamented with bugles of beads; two pink offrich feathers fixed in front, to fall over the head .- 7. A hat of white chip, turned up all round, the crown covered with white crape; a bow behild, and at the fide .- 3. A large ffraw bonnet, turned up behind with a button, and tied under the chin with blue ribbons .- q. The Ohi hat of ftraw or chip.

The favourite colours are litac; buff, yellow, and pink: feathers, and flowers of all kinds; continue to be universally worn as ornaments.

THE ROBBERIES AT THE COLLEGE OF SURGEONS.

Dublin, Wednesday.—This afternoon, in the Southern Divisional Police Court—before Mr. Woodlock—James M'Dougal, a porter in the employment of the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons, was brought up in custody of Detective-Officers Stratford and Dawson, charged on remand with having stolen letters, some of which contained postal orders addressed to Dr. Humphrey Minchin, treasurer of the Irish Medical Association. The prisoner was also charged with having forged Dr. Minchin's signature to the postal orders, which were subsequently cashed. The accused was again remanded.

SQUASH OR ZUCCHINI SWEET PICKLES

8 CUPS SLICED SOUASH OR ZUCCHINI

- FOR BRINE: 1 ½ OUARTS ICE WATER

- 2/3 CUP PICKLING SALT

2 CUPS THINLY SLICED BELL PEPPER

2 CUPS THINLY SLICED ONION

1 CUP THINLY SLICED RED BELL PEPPER (OPTIONAL, FOR COLOR)

SYRUP:

3 CUPS SUGAR 2 CUPS WHITE VINEGAR 2 TABLESPOONS MUSTARD SEED 1 TABLESPOON CELERY SEED



SOAK SQUASH OR ZUCCHINI FOR 1 HOUR IN A BRINE MADE OF 1 ½ QUARTS ICE WATER AND 2/3 CUP PICKLING SALT. POUR OFF BRINE.

IN A LARGE STOCK POT, MAKE SYRUP OF SUGAR, VINEGAR AND SPICES. BOIL **5-10 MINUTES.**

ADD VEGETABLES. BRING TO A BOIL AGAIN, BUT DO NOT COOK. FILL JARS WITH **VEGETABLE MIXTURE, COVER WITH SYRUP.**


REMOVE AIR BUBBLES, WIPE SEALING EDGE, AND SEAL WITH NEW LIDS.

BREAKFAST COOKIES

1 RIPE BANANA – MASHED
1/4 CUP CREAMY PEANUT BUTTER
3 TABLESPOONS MAPLE SYRUP
1 TEASPOON VANILLA EXTRACT
1 CUP OF OLD-FASHIONED ROLLED OATS

1/2 TEASPOON CINNAMON

¼ TEASPOON SALT

1/4 CUP DRIED CRANBERRIES

14 CUP CHOPPED PECANS

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. PREHEAT OVEN TO 350 DEGREES FAHRENHEIT.
- 2. IN A BOWL MIX BANANAS, PEANUT BUTTER, MAPLE SYRUP, AND VANILLA EXTRACT. STIR TOGETHER UNTIL MIXED WELL.
- 3. ADD ROLLED OATS, CINNAMON, AND SALT. STIR TO COMBINE.
- 4. STIR IN DRIED CRANBERRIES AND CHOPPED PECANS. STIR TO COMBINE.
- 5. LINE A BAKING SHEET WITH PARCHMENT PAPER. USE A COOKIE SCOOP OR SPOON TO SCOOP THE COOKIE BATTER INTO ROUGHLY 2 TABLESPOON PORTIONS. PLACE THE COOKIES ON A BAKING SHEET ABOUT 3 INCHES APART. USE BACK OF SCOOP OR SPOON TO FLATTEN JUST A LITTLE.
- 6. BAKE COOKIES FOR 15-17 MINUTES OR UNTIL GOLDEN BROWN. REMOVE COOKIES FROM THE OVEN AND LET THEM COOL SLIGHTLY ON THE BAKING SHEET BEFORE TRANSFERRING THEM TO WIRE RACK TO COOL COMPLETELY.

GOOD GUMBO:

A typical Creole recipe for which we've had requests is a Shrimp Gumbo, Here's an especially good one that we've tried that comes from New Orleans:

SHRIMP GUMBO

2 thsps. shortening

1 lb. fresh, canned or frozen okra, sliced

1 onion, chopped

1 bunch green onions, chopped

1/2 cup celery, chopped

1 can (No. 1) tomatoes

2 sprigs parsley, chopped

1 bay leaf

1 sprig thyme

2 qts. water

Salt and pepper to taste

11/2 lbs. (headless, raw) shrimp, peeled

File, if desired

Fry okra in shortening until it ceases to "rope", about 30-45 mins. Add onions and celery and cook until soft, about 5 mins. Stir in tomatoes, parsley, bay leaf, thyme, and water. Simmer for 1/2 hour. Add the shrimp and simmer for 30 minutes longer.

Remove from heat. Stir in 1 tsp. file' just before serving, if desired. Never cook file'. Gumbo is better if cooked early in the morning and allowed to stand several hours. Serve with cooked rice. Serves 6.

Porcupine Sausage Balls.

2 tablespoons butter

1 small onion, chopped

1 green pepper, chopped

21/2 cups canned tomatoes

1 tablespoon sugar

1 pound bulk pork sausage

34 cup uncooked rice

Melt butter in frying pan and brown onion in it. Add chopped

green pepper, tomatoes, sugar. and salt. Cook until green pepper is tender. Make the sausage into small balls and roll in the un-



cooked rice. Place in greased baking casserole and pour the tomato mixture over the sausage balls. Cover baking dish and bake 11/2 hours in a moderate oven (350 degrees).

Summer STEM program provides hands-on learning experiences

With the help of a donation made by Friends of Crowville, Franklin Parish Library and Louisiana Delta Community College - Winnsboro Campus (LDCC) held their second STEM program for the year on Monday, June 16, in the Library Learning Center.

As part of the Library's summer reading program, children aged 9 to 13 were invited to attend this all-day workshop full of handson, STEM-related activities as well as a visit to Big Winn Studios.

Some of the hands-on activities included experimenting with magnetism, problem-solving with gravity mazes, learning to code three different types of robots, exploring finger-print types, learning about the power (and danger) of electricity.

Ed Beall with Northeast Louisiana Power Cooperative (NELPCO) led the session on electricity.

Students participating in the STEM event also had an opportunity to learn about the process of music, television, and movie production thanks to Big Winn Studios' Shane Mitchelli and Charlie Maughon.

The power of static electricity was explored with the Van De Graaff generator thanks to Edward Hall, chemistry instructor at LDCC.

Volunteers included staff and patrons of Franklin Parish Library, LDCC, Northeast Louisiana Power Cooperative, Downtown Scoops, Winnsboro Main Street, and Big Winn Studios.


