Ogden And Baskin Take Home Parish Basketball Crown

The Ogden High school boys snatched the parish basketball crown from Fort Necessity by a 72-65 score Saturday night and prepared to go on to the North Louisiana District Basketball tournament at Louisiana Tech today, Friday and Saturday.

Pacing the Ogden squad was Noel Fain, who scored 32 points during the parish tournament finals at Crowville High school. Daniel Buchan of Fort Necessity led his squad in scoring with 17 points.

In semi-final games Ogden defeated Winnsboro, 51 to 46, and Fort downed Baskin, 52 to 50.

In girls' finals, Franklin parish's two championship teams, Baskin and Winnsboro, met for the third time this season. Emerging as victors for the second time this year over Winnsboro with a score of 39 to 31, Baskin was awarded the coveted first-place trophy.

High scorer in the girls' finals was Glenda Bennett of Winnsboro, who scored 26 points in the finals. Betty Ruth Jarrette of Baskin was close behind with 23 points.

A 69-49 victory over Central placed Baskin in the finals, while Winnsboro defeated Fort Necessity 39 to 35 in an overtime battle in the semi-finals.

Receipts of the tourney, which netted each participating school \$54.78, were, according to Principal F. P. Talbert of Crowville High school: Friday afternoon, \$182.25; Saturday afternoon, \$189.05; and Saturday night, \$303.50; total, \$674.80.







ONE RECIPE YOU CAN PREPARE FOR YOUR FAMILY THIS MONTH IS A VEGETABLE SKILLET LASAGNA, A ONE-PAN TWIST ON A FAMILIAR FAVORITE THAT SWAPS HEAVY LAYERS FOR A LIGHTER, VEGGIE-FORWARD APPROACH.

VEGETABLE SKILLET LASAGNA

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 TBSP OLIVE OIL
- 1 SMALL ONION, DICED
- 1 BELL PEPPER, DICED
- 2 CUPS SLICED ZUCCHINI OR YELLOW SQUASH
- 2 CUPS FRESH SPINACH
- 2 CLOVES GARLIC, MINCED
- 1 CAN (14 OZ) CRUSHED TOMATOES, NO SALT ADDED
- 1 CUP LOW-SODIUM BROTH
- 6 WHOLE-GRAIN LASAGNA NOODLES, BROKEN INTO PIECES
- ½ CUP PART-SKIM RICOTTA OR SMALL-CURD COTTAGE CHEESE
- ½ CUP SHREDDED MOZZARELLA
- FRESH BASIL OR PARSLEY FOR GARNISH
- SALT, PEPPER, AND RED PEPPER FLAKES TO TASTE

DIRECTIONS:

SAUTÉ ONION, BELL PEPPER, GARLIC, AND VEGETABLES IN OLIVE OIL UNTIL SOFTENED. ADD CRUSHED TOMATOES, BROTH, AND BROKEN LASAGNA NOODLES. COVER AND SIMMER UNTIL NOODLES ARE TENDER. STIR IN SPINACH UNTIL WILTED. DOLLOP RICOTTA ON TOP, SPRINKLE WITH MOZZARELLA, COVER BRIEFLY TO MELT, AND FINISH WITH HERBS. IF YOUR FAMILY ISN'T READY FOR WHOLE-GRAIN PASTA YET – JUST USE REGULAR OR USE ½ WHOLE-GRAIN AND ½ REGULAR.

THE DISH REFLECTS SEVERAL PILLARS OF THE NEW USDA GUIDELINES: MORE VEGETABLES, MORE WHOLE GRAINS, AND FEWER PROCESSED INGREDIENTS — ALL WITHOUT LOSING THE WARMTH AND FAMILIARITY LOUISIANA FAMILIES EXPECT FROM A WEEKNIGHT COMFORT MEAL. AS NATIONAL NUTRITION MONTH ENCOURAGES AMERICANS TO RETHINK THEIR PLATES

RECIPES FROM YESTER-YEAR

ICE BOX COOKIES

1 cup shortening or margarine
2 cups brown sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs
3 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup chopped pecans

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and beat well. Add vanilla. Sift dry ingredients together. Add nuts and then dry ingredients to creamed mixture. Divide dough in fourths and sixths, depending on size cookie desired. Roll in wax paper or foil and store in refrigerator overnight. Slice 1/4-inch thick and bake on greased cookie sheet at 375 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 7 to 12 dozen cookies.

If wrapped and sealed tightly in foil these will keep beautifully in freezer up to three months before baking. If frozen more than overnight thaw for a few minutes before slicing.

Recipe variations:

Substitute 1 3/4 cups granulated sugar in place of brown.

Substitute 1 cup finely diced red and green cherries or candied pineapple for the nuts.

Using granulated sugar method, substitute 1 cup grated coconut. Follow mixing and baking method as above.

SEVEN SEAS CASSEROLE

1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 1/8 cup milk or water
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup finely chopped onions
1 tbsp. lemon juice

Combine all and bring to a boil over low heat. Pour half into a large deep casserole, buttered. Then in layers add:

1 1/3 cups instant rice
1 (8-oz.) can tuna, drained
Small pkg. frozen green peas, thawed

Add remaining soup, top with American cheese slices and sprinkle with paprika. Cover and bake 20 minutes in preheated 375 degree oven.





